# First Bull Run

# July 21, 1861 Virginia

"In every case I believe that the firing of the rebels was better than ours. At any rate I am sure that ours was very bad, the rear files sometimes firing into and killing the front ones."

#### Background

During the early months of the war political pressure was brought on the Union field commander Irwin McDowell to quickly advance, engage the enemy, and end the rebellion. Also, on McDowell's mind was the fact that many of his troops were three month volunteers whose enlistment would shortly expire, leaving him without a sufficient force with which to confront the Confederates. Marching out of Washington on the 16th July, McDowell came up with a plan to outflank the Rebel defenses on Bull Run. His columns set out from Centreville, just to the north of the Confederate lines, on July 21.

The Confederates, on the other hand, had deployed their army to cover the many fords which offered a crossing of Bull Run. Aware of the Federal advance, the Confederates had carried out a strategic movement by rail, the first such use of railroads in military history, bringing east the forces in the Shenandoah to reinforce the troops spread out behind Bull Run. The sighting of the approaching Federals was immediately relayed throughout the Rebel command, and, acting alone, Brigadier General Nathan Evans quickly moved to intercept the Yankee columns. More Rebel brigades were set in motion towards Henry Hill while Evan's advanced to buy time for their deployment.

McDowell was initially victorious and destroyed the first three Confederate Brigades in his path. Their stubborn resistance, however, ensured that when the disorganized Yankees assaulted Henry Hill, they met a careful defense orchestrated by Thomas "Stonewall" Jackson. After some bitter fighting, the Northerners were repulsed. The arrival of further Rebel reinforcements from their far right flank sealed the fate of the battle and the Union withdrawal degenerated into a rout.

Federal losses were 418 killed, 1,011 wounded and 1,216 missing. Confederate accounts show 387 dead, 1,582 wounded and 12 missing.

#### THE WARGAME

The action begins at 9:30 a.m. and ends at 5 p.m.

#### DEPLOYMENT

Porter's Brigade is arriving at point A, further reinforcements arrive as follows: 10 a.m., Franklin's Brigade and Heintzelman at A; 10:30, Wilcox's Brigade at A;

12 noon, Sherman's Brigade at B; 12:15, Keyes' Brigade and Tyler at B; 1:30, Howard's Brigade at A.

Confederate reserves arrive as follows: 10 a.m., Hampton's Legion at D, Squires' Battery at C; 10:30, Jackson's Brigade, Rockbridge Artillery and Alburtis' Battery at C; 11 a.m., Standard's Battery and Beauregard at C, 1st Virginia Cavalry at D; 11:30, 49th and 8th Virginia, Loudan Artillery and Cocke at C; 1 p.m., 18th Virginia at C, 6th North Carolina at D; 1:30, Kershaw's Detachment and Kemper's Battery at D; 2 p.m., 28th Virginia at D; 3 p.m., Smith's Brigade and Beckham's Battery at D; 3:30 p.m., Early's Brigade and 19th Virginia at D.

# TERRAIN

All woods, and the slopes of Henry Hill are normal movement.

# VICTORY CONDITIONS

The Federals must drive the Confederates from Henry Hill, which means they must have more regiments on the hill at the end of the game than do the Rebels.

# **COMMANDS:**

Union - 7 Confederate - 8

# SCALES:

Time - 15 minutes per turn

**Units** – Strengths are base roughly on 100 to 1000 man Regiments and their Experience. The nonlinear numbers for Infantry and Cavalry can be changed to a linear numbers, by reducing the next number in the row by one, down to the last number which should be a one. **Map** - 1" = 40 yards / Each square is 12 inches
