June 25, 1862 Virginia

Background

On April 4, 1862, the Army of the Potomac, led by George Brinton McClellan, advanced up the James Peninsula with the intention of capturing the Rebel capital of Richmond. Despite having a huge numerical advantage McClellan took almost seven weeks to arrive within striking distance of the city. Expecting further reinforcements from Major General Irwin McDowell's First Corps, McClellan based his operations north of the Chickahominy River to be in a better position to meet and use McDowell's troops when they arrived.

Although still outnumbered the Confederates were able to take the offensive on May 31 at the Battle of Seven Pines. Even though the Rebels were beaten off, the wounding of Joseph E. Johnston opened the way for Robert E. Lee to take field command of the Rebel effort. He immediately set in motion a plan to take advantage of the Union deployment.

McClellan, however, struck first, one day before Lee had planned to launch an assault incorporating Jackson's army from the Shenandoah Valley. The Federals merely wanted to move forward and capture Old Tavern to allow them the use of the road network to the north. To facilitate this movement Hooker's Division of Heintzelman's Corps advanced along the Williamsburg road. The Confederates of Huger's Division contested Hooker's advance. Although the Federals were relatively successful the attack was called off, only to be half-heartedly renewed several hours later. By late afternoon, the Federals found themselves within five miles of Richmond. The next day Lee struck back, opening the first of the Seven Day's Battles.

Federal losses were 67 killed, 504 wounded and 55 missing. The Confederate loss came to 441.

THE WARGAME

This scenario concentrates on the early morning phase of the action and therefore begins at 8 a.m. and ends at 11:30 a.m.

DEPLOYMENT

The Federal artillery arrives at 8 a.m., Battery D, 1st New York at B, and Clark's Section at C. For the Confederates, the Portsmouth Virginia Artillery arrives at 8 a.m. at A.

TERRAIN

White Oak Swamp (river line) is difficult movement, and the woods are simple movement. All works are considered light.

VICTORY CONDITIONS

Either side can win outright by gaining control of both French's Farm and Kings School House by the end of the game, otherwise the side which causes the most casualties wins.

COMMANDS:

Union - 3 Confederate – 3

SCALES:

Time – 15 minutes per turn *Units* – Strengths are base roughly on 100 to 1000 man Regiments and their Experience. The nonlinear numbers for Infantry and Cavalry can be changed to a linear numbers, by reducing the next number in the row by one, down to the last. *Map* - 1" = 40 yards / Each square is 12 inches
